xx. 33. The account of Jehoshaphat's tremendous army (1,160,000 men) and the rich tribute received from (among others) the Philistines and the Arabs (II Chron. xvii. 10 stseq.) is not historical. It is in harmony with the theory worked out in Chronicles that pious monarchs have always been the mightiest and most prosperous.



JEHOSHAPHAT, VALLEY OF: A valley mentioned by the prophet Juel (Juel iv. [A. V. iii.] 2. 12), where, after the return of Judah and Jerusa-

(the present Wadi Sitti Maryam, which separates Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives, and through which at one time the stream Kidron flowell), and believe that the Last Judgment will be held there. According to the Midrash Tehillin (viii.; quoted by Neubauer, "G. T." p. 31) no "valley called Jehoshaphat" exists (PEDIAT BOOD PO) PN).

JEHOVAH: A mispronunciation (introduced by Christian theologians, but almost cutirely disregarded by the Jews) of the Hebrew "Ynwn," the (ineffable) name of God (the Tethagrammatox or "Siem ha-Meforash"). This pronunciation is grammatically impossible; it arose through pronouncing the yowels

 of the "kere" (marginal reading of the Masorites:
'YPR = "Adonay") with the consonants of the "ketib" (text-reading: may = "Ymwn")—"Adonay"
(the Lord) being substituted with one exception
wherever Ymwn occurs in the Biblical and liturgical
books. "Adonay" presents the vowels "shewa"
(the composite = under the guttural & heromes
simple = under the '), "holem," and "kamez." and
these give the reading may (= "Jehovah"). Sometimes, when the two names may and 'ymg occur together, the former is pointed with "hatef sego!"
(=) under the '—thus, may (="Jehovah")—to indicate that in this combination it is to be pronounced
"Elohim" (D'M)). These substitutions of "Ado-
